Taft Program Needs Support By Anne Lunde (1969)

We are very lucky to have one of our alums in such a prominent position in a local newspaper. The following is an editorial that she published in the Edison-Norwood Pioneer Press, January 16, 2003 in an effort to alert friends and neighbors of Taft High School.

"When the Northwest Side looks back on the perceived 'golden age' of Taft High School, it is to the days when Taft had significant numbers of students who achieved academically and in extracurricular activities.

The biggest challenge Taft continues to face now is turning its current melting pot of transfer students from other neighborhoods, foreign-language students, and a much smaller percentage of local students into a cohesive, well-functioning school population.

Residents on neighboring blocks were impatient with that process and forced the school to change its entrance to face Bryn Mawr Avenue, so students wouldn't walk near their houses. As a result, the school has just officially changed its address to 6530 W. Bryn Mawr Ave., while its earlier, more familiar entrances on Natoma, Hurlbut and Northcott, are locked tight.

One of the bright lights in restoring Taft's reputation is the seventh and eighth grade Academic Center, now in its fourth year. These are smart, enthusiastic students – the sort Taft once attracted easily – and are the hope for building a strong gifted component for the ninth through 12th grades. This program draws from across the North Side of the city and depends on the elementary busing program to transport its students.

The Academic Center is a program worth keeping and nurturing. However, although it is barely established, the Chicago Public Schools may sidetrack it as part of a budget proposal to cancel the transportation program. The Taft junior high program was designed to draw a limited number of students from any single feeder school – to avoid criticism it was draining too many gifted students – and that means the children are scattered in many neighborhoods, not always easily connected to Taft by public transportation and not always convenient for carpooling.

The Taft Local School Council is launching a campaign to save the busing component so the junior high center can continue to draw enough students.

Transportation hearings are planned later this month [January 22] by the School Board. Taft officials would appreciate help from the community in sending letters to board members.

As a result of the combined efforts of Anne Lunde, 41st Alderman Brian Doherty, Community representative Jim Del Medico, Taft Academic Center Director Maria Asvos and others, the Chicago Board of Education reached a compromise decision. Instead of cutting all bus service for these students entirely, they cut bus service routes in half, causing affected students to find their own way to designated pick up points, usually a designated elementary school. Since the change doesn't take effect until the next school year, the ramifications to this change are unknown. We can only hope parents understand the importance of this valuable program to ensure they continue to get their children to the Taft Academic Center next year and beyond.

Iraq War Affects Taft

Aside from the expected psychological effects of the extensive coverage on the War in Iraq, local consequences have been felt. A travel ban on out-of-state trips was set March 20, 2003 as a direct result of the onset of the war. A Washington, D.C. trip was cancelled for Taft students just one day before they were to leave for a weeklong visit to our nation's capital. This ban could be in effect until the end of the school year, depending on how events go in the upcoming weeks. Even though it appears the war has shifted to being a rebuilding and cleanup effort, officials still strongly urge caution in traveling, especially to high-risk areas like Washington, D.C.

As a result of relaxed tensions, the class trip has just been rescheduled and will have been completed by the time this newsletter is received.

Taft Increasing Boundaries?

In an attempt to decrease overcrowding pressures at Steinmetz and Forman High Schools, the Chicago Board of Education may amend Taft's boundaries to include four additional feeder schools. They are Canty, 3740 N. Panama Ave; Bridge, 3800 N. New England Ave., Smyser, 4310 N. Melvina Ave., and O.A. Thorp Scholastic Academy, 6024 W. Warwick Ave. This change, proposed to be effective for the next school year, could push Taft's enrollment to capacity levels, thereby making it no longer available to students living outside Taft's attendance area.

Currently, Taft's enrollment is 1,760, close to what school officials say is its program capacity of 1,800. These boundary changes could put the enrollment numbers up to 2,000 by next fall. The Chicago Board of Education was also considering changing Prosser High School's selective admissions policy (similar to Lane H.S.) to return it to being a neighborhood school.

Reminiscing with the Norwood Drum and Bugle Corps

The photos that were published in the spring and autumn 2002 issues of the Taft Alumni Newsletter are of The Junior Corps in 1933 and 1947. They were not the famous Norwood Park Senior Corps that **John A. Will** (January 1949) was a part of. They were very good, while all of us (in the Junior Corps – “B” Corps) were just beginners.

I would like to take this opportunity to share some information regarding the history of the Norwood Park Junior, Drum, Bugle and Fife Corps.

Recently, **Douglas Small**, **Bob Kofoed**, and I had lunch together. We were all drummers in The Junior Corps. We feel that the first picture that was published was taken in 1933, or 1934. We know we marched at The Chicago Worlds Fair in both 33 and 34. Bob Kofoed says he knows we were at The Fair, because he remembers sneaking into the Sally Rand fan dance show.

We were a regular attraction of any parade we could get into. On the Fourth of July parade our Corps always ended up at The Norwood Park Old People's Home, where we gave a "concert," consisting of all of the four pieces we knew.

Bob Crow, was our senior drummer. I use the word "senior" because he was in the eighth grade at Onahan, while most of the rest of us were in fourth or fifth grade, or lower. One Christmas, Bob received a drum. Mr. Whidmeyer, who lived three doors from Bob on Newberg Ave., became so tired of hearing Bob just banging on the drum, that he offered to teach him how

to really play the drum. If that is what you do to, or on a drum.

The Crows, the Bornhofs, and the Trick families were all members of The Christian Science Church in Park Ridge. Like all families, our parents were looking for something for their children to do. I think our mothers met with Mr. Whidmeyer and asked him to please take these kids off our hands. Little did our parents know what they would be getting into. Somehow **Jack Bornhof** and I received drums about the same time. We also began taking drum lessons from Mr. Whidmeyer. Mr. Bornhof was a member of The Norwood Park American Legion Post. I believe he had much to do with the organizing of The Junior Corps.

The fourth drummer, to join the Corps, was **Warren Webster**. I do not know how he became involved, but "The Condor," (his nick name) played a mean alto sax in our first Taft Dance Band.

In the picture I am referring to, each of the three above named families had two children in The Corps. As I look at the picture again, I believe ten or twelve families each had two or more future famous Taft Alumni in the Junior Corps. I know the Passow family had three.

Eventually Mr. W. felt it was time we learned how to march. So, in the spring and summer, twice a week, we marched up and down Avondale Ave. There was no traffic at that time, as Avondale did not go through. In the fall and winter we practiced in The Norwood Park Field House, the drums in one room and the bugles in another room. Our parents were always there to cheer us on and to help in any way they could. We had no fancy drills or special parade formations, just staying in step and marching in the resemblance of a straight line, was a major accomplishment for us.

"In those days" we didn't have any TV to disturb our creativity. No organized soccer, baseball, swimming teams, or whatever kids have now to keep them busy. We did swim in the Norwood Park swimming pool, with its sand bottom. Of course we had no computers to mess up our games of roller skate Hockey, played on Nordica Ave. These games were made up of the kids in the neighborhood who happened to have the old metal clamp on skates with four wheels that would manage to fall off at any given moment. Also to keep us busy, many of us would religiously hurry home from school to listen on WGN to the final innings of Cub's games.

We did listen to The Lone Ranger, Dick Steel, Little Orphan Annie, and Jack Armstrong, the All-American Boy. I know there were other radio shows, maybe some of you can remember them. But, the Corps was the only organized activity for grade school kids and their families, outside of church doings, and the Boy Scouts.

Little **Bill Bornhof**, was one of the two tenor drummers in the Junior Corps. A couple of years later

I gave him his first saxophone lesson. He also played with us in the early Taft dance band. that "**Pops**" **Rapier** started. Now there is a lot of Taft History. Every Friday, after school we played for dancing in the gym. I believed we charged 15 cents to get in. That income helped us to buy new music for the band. I think our loudest fastest number was, The One o'clock Jump. I am sure **Mr. Teuscher**, the assistant principle was there to supervise everything that went on.

We were a Drum and Bugle Corps until some mothers said to Mr. W., can you somehow find a way to get our daughters into the act. So Mr. W. brought in the Fifes for the girls. As soon as the Corps started we grew by leaps and bounds.

Our parents were expected to buy the instruments for us, but because we were sponsored by The American Legion Post, I don't believe any child who wanted to be in The Corps was ever turned down.

From the picture I have in front of me (see the Spring, 2002 issue – 1933 Junior Corps), I notice our Corps did have four D-G bugles. Now that was the beginning of real marching music.

Our Junior Corps didn't last long. By the time we were in Lane, Steinmetz, or Schurz, we were no longer interested in The Corps. Taft was just being built in 1937 and 1938.

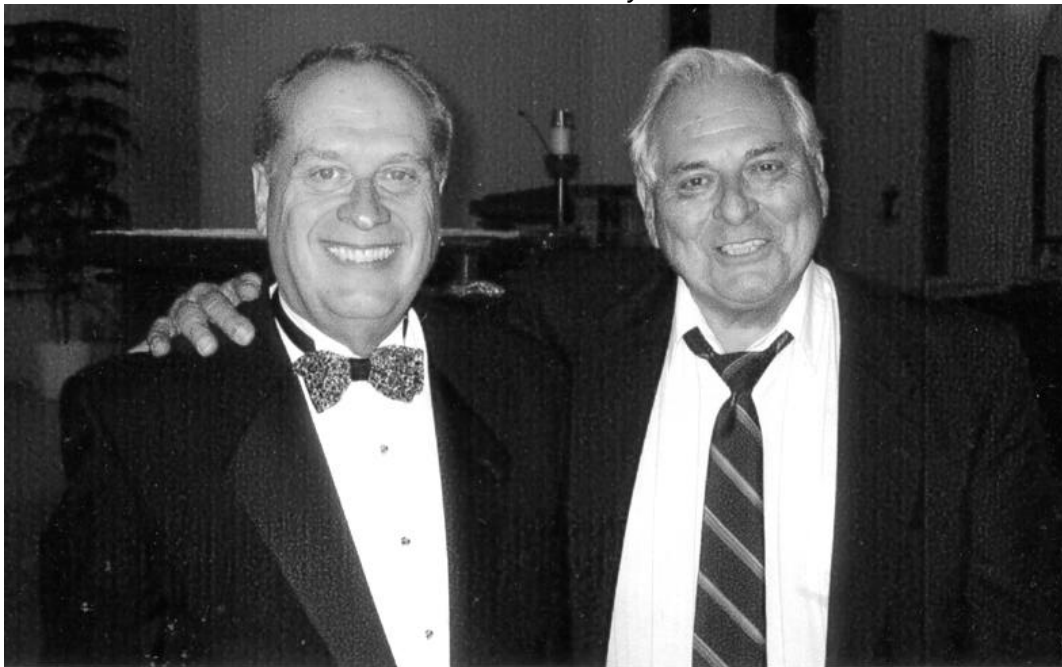
