We Congratulate Taft Class of 2019

Graduations for Taft High School seniors are always a bit different, but members of earlier classes would find many similarities.

For several years Taft has taken advantage of its proximity to Rosemont and its theatre at River Road and Balmoral. Between mid-May and the end of June, this venue is booked solid by area high school districts. It has parking, it has accessibility and access to major routes. It has sufficient seating and was built with sightlines on the main floor and balcony. And, while it may take time to leave the parking area, it doesn't take two hours in rush hour traffic to reach earlier venue choices.

Principal Mark Grishaber challenged this year's seniors with incentives to replace misbehaving...and if they worked hard and met the goals, they could even earn extra tickets for the ceremony. On June 9 they marched in to Elgar's "Pomp and Circumstance," only to find that they would be sitting in chairs on the stage. The Wind Ensemble was against the back curtain, speakers and assistant principals were across the front, and close to 670 students were ushered into chairs in between,

Grishaber pointed out that this was their "reward" because on the Friday before graduation the audience seating proved to be oversold by 600. Their families could watch the ceremony on giant broadcast screens, and the class would have to wait to see the Senior Class video later.

The magnitude of this class, one of the largest since the 1970s, could be measured by how many choruses of "Pomp and Circumstance" were needed for the procession. Including pre-ceremony performances by the Taft chorus, the ceremony lasted more than three hours, before tassels were moved and a few inflated volleyballs flipped into the air.

For a number of years, with smaller classes and venues, the home room division teachers had recited their names, but

after the shift to Rosemont a few years ago, Brian Lavery from the Fine Arts Department had taken on the task. He left Taft for a new position last year, and it took three readers to replace him this year.

Grishaber encourages graduation audiences to recognize veterans and first responders. He asks graduates in the audience to stand and be recognized.

The "Taft Alumni Pledge" was added a few years ago, to remind new graduates that they are joining a larger group. There have been an estimated 106 Taft graduation ceremonies since June 1940, including the years when there were January classes. Staff members who are Taft graduates take turns leading the pledge, this year teacher Kayla Jaffe (2013), one of the senior division teachers, had the honor.

Taft's academic ratings have grown with its International Baccalaureate program, and 172 colleges and universities are listed as destinations for this year's graduates. They'll be studying in half of the states and have qualified for \$25,836.000 in scholarships.

Taft's 2019 valedictorian, Beity Yang, reminded her classmates of the challenges of high school: long hours of homework, trying to get to school by the 7:30 a.m. starting times without dark circles under their eyes.

Those times are over, she said. The Taft class of 2019 will be heading out to the next stage of their lives: to college or the military or other career choices. Teachers helped them expand their minds, preparing them to integrate with the world, equipping them to persevere.

It may seem a frightening challenge, she said, but, "You Can Do It!"

Success in life, she insisted, is not defined by meeting societal pressures or being super-intelligent. Athletes achieve by working hard to improve their physical skills. Rosa Parks became a leader through her courage.

Everyone is capable of success, Yang added, "Be audacious. Be strong and be true to yourself."

Beity Yang has been an IB scholar, member of National Honor Society, active in the Helping Hand program and the Filipino Club.

2019 Alumni Scholarships

The Taft Alumni Association presented \$1,000 scholarships to three members of Taft's 2019 graduating class. Because of the advanced course work in Taft's curriculum, all three students have weighted grade point averages above A.

Mia Cinquini, ranking 50th in the class, is the recipient of a scholarship donated by Ruth Artisuk, a retired Taft chemistry teacher, who donated this scholarship to

encourage graduates pursuing a career in science. Mia plans to get her degree in nursing and had been accepted at five universities when she applied for our scholarship.

She has been vice president of student government at Taft and a member of the Environmental Club, Student Voice Committee, and National Honor Society. As a junior she was an Eagle Mentor, helping freshmen.

She is team captain of both the Track and Field and Cross-Country teams. She earned the Eagle Award in Cross Country for her dedication and leadership. She runs despite a need to use an inhaler and has been an inspiration to her teammates.

Through her youth group at St. Robert Bellarmine parish, she has assisted in charitable programs to assist families in inner city neighborhoods. She worked with the Chicago Park District summer programs and when her local park hosted winter games for Special Olympics.

Isabella Aviles, 42nd in the class, has plans to go to medical school and become an obstetrician or gynecologist.

At Taft she has been captain of the Varsity Poms team for two years (Poms have one of the longest seasons in Taft's sports calendar) and won the Coach's award for her leadership. She was a member of Student Government and vice president of National Honor Society. She was a member of the Zumba Club and an Eagle Mentor for two years.

She has volunteered as a helper for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, assisting with childcare while parents attend information seminars, and hopes to help families, especially women, in overcoming health concerns. She worked several years at Whelan Pool as a lifeguard and swim instructor.

Ariel Arista, ranking 25th, wants to be an elementary school teacher. She says she was inspired to pursue teaching after the positive experiences she had at Taft.

She is president of the South Asian Club, which performs for International Night at Taft, but also was involved in Hawaiian and Belly Dancing Club. She also was president of the International Baccalaureate Student Leadership group at Taft. She was a member of National Honor Society, the Eagle Mentor program, Helping Hands, badminton, and the Taft Tennis Club.

Although Taft offers IB study opportunities across the school, a select few pursue the extra challenges of earning an IB diploma, which can earn them world recognition. Ariel, a member of the French B diploma program was one

of 21 students from Taft who qualified for a special trip to France this spring.

Will Taft Remember You?

Principal congratulates a record-breaking class



through my speeches in the auditorium, and the best homecoming dances in the nation."

Principal Mark Grishaber called the Taft Class of 2019 record breaking in a number of ways at the June 9 graduation ceremony.

"You had to practice on a dirt field for four years. (As) you leave today we have a brand-new athletic field that so many students will be able to enjoy. "So many students followed you and chose Taft over the selective enrollment and private schools that we needed to open a new Freshman Academy which will open this August. You can brag you're the last Taft class that spent all four of your years at the Varsity campus.

"You all made history. "You made it through your classes...through many late nights, the countless drills and inspections. You made it

Eighty-five students made it into the National Honor Society; 45 qualified as Illinois State Scholars. Chicago Public Schools requires 40 hours of community service, the graduates this year earned a collective 45,309 hours, and several personally reached even higher: Elizabeth Ahrens with 584 hours and Adan Mulvaney with 536.

"Four years ago, Taft was being recognized as one of the top high schools in Chicago," Grishaber said. "I asked you to make Taft the best IB school in Illinois, and you did... You leave here today, and Taft is being recognized as one of the best high schools in the nation by U.S. News and World Report."

Grishaber said Taft is now the largest International Baccalaureate program in Illinois, and with close to 90 percent of the students coming from the Taft feeder community, he declared it (at least) the best neighborhood school in Chicago.

In four years, the class of 2019 teams earned 36 conference championships, played football at Soldier Field, won 11 city championships including, in 2018-19, Poms, Wrestling, Football and Boys Indoor Track. The counters in the main office were filled with awards by June.

"Will we remember you? How could we ever forget you?" Grishaber asked.

When Norwood Park Students Moved into Mobile Units

The Taft Class of 1969, celebrating its 50th anniversary this year, started with a milestone.

The main building at Natoma and Hurlbut had already outgrown its first addition, and was on a 10-period day, with morning divisions for the upper grades and afternoon divisions for younger grades. An experiment, shifting some students to part of Norwood Park School, became a home for the entire freshman class in September 1965. There were about 900 in the class.

It was a similar solution (although considered to be less long term) to moving Taft's current 7th to 9th grades into a freshman academy this summer.

Jim and Marge Kelly and their family lived a block away. In fall 1965 their oldest son, George, was part of the freshman class. The youngest Kelly, Bob, started school in the portable classrooms (dubbed "Willis Wagons" for school superintendent Benjamin Willis) which were installed behind Norwood Park School for the whole grade school enrollment.

Mobile Units Cont'd

Jim was a local community leader, who helped to start the Norwood Park Historical Society in 1973. Marge became president of the Norwood Park School PTA.

This year, Bob, who likes to build models, assembled an exhibit with models of the mobile units and information on the near decade when Norwood Park School operated outside of its 1916 school building. It wasn't until Taft got a designation for one part to be a

that planning could start for the wing where the offices, lunchroom, fine arts and library are now located.

Bob spent his grade school years in the mobile classrooms, and when he was choosing a high school, he picked Lane Tech. The impacts of the Norwood Park Branch reverberated in the community for several decades, and when local elementary enrollment stayed low, led later to relocating the old District One (later Sub-District One) offices to the far Northwest Side from Irving Park.

The mobile units exhibit will be on display through the end of October on the second floor of the Noble-Seymour-Crippen House, 5624 N. Newark Ave., one block west of Taft and a couple of doors north of Bryn Mawr. Regular hours are noon to 4 p.m. Saturdays. Reunion groups can call 773-631-4633 to make arrangements for special tours. Admission is free.
